Are you a Steward for IPE?

When asked, "Are you familiar with interprofessional collaborative practice?" most folks will indicate that they are. However, when questioned further, many reveal that they regard simple interaction with other professions as collaborative practice. Is interprofessional collaborative practice more than simply engaging with others?

Interprofessional collaborative practice means understanding the scope and limits of others' professions. It means understanding the value of conferring with others on best practices and ideal patient care. It means recruiting the participation of other professions when creating a team of healthcare providers. It means actively listening to others even when your thoughts or position may differ from theirs.

Becoming collaborative in practice is not easy. It takes a conscious effort to engage others in a meaningful way and to respect the opinion of others, especially when they differ from your own. There are many interprofessional educational activities that the Office of IPE offers on a regular basis that help students from across all healthcare professions to become better stewards of interprofessional collaborative practice. 

Interprofessional practice and education is universally guided by four core competencies as defined by the nationally recognized Interprofessional Education Collaborative (IPEC).

Values and Ethics for interprofessional practice —

One of the core competencies of interprofessional practice and education is to promote a climate of mutual respect and shared values among all healthcare professions. This concept entails many aspects, including: respecting the privacy and dignity of patient while maintaining confidentiality; promoting health equity across the life span and keeping the patient at the center of care delivery; respecting the cultures, values, and roles of other healthcare professionals and recognizing the impact these factors can have on outcomes; and developing a trust relationship with patients, families, and other team members. We should always keep values and ethical considerations foremost in our minds when engaging with others.
